

Seniors say good-bye to Leonard High

They had worked at least 13 years to get to this point in their life - a turning point, a milestone, a huge achievement. The Leonard High School Class of 2011 marched onto the field for their graduation, and they were ready.

After an opening prayer and the playing and singing of the Star Spangled Banner by the LHS band and choir - minus the Senior members - the ceremony began.

Salutatorian Catelyn Cash started off by apologizing for the heat.

"We can't help it if we're the hottest class from Leonard," she said, prompting laughter from the audience.



She took a few minutes to highlight special memories in her high school career, from her freshman year on up to her final year at LHS. Those moments included the Senior class dominating the Powder Puff games, college preparation and study, and lounging on the library couch after dual credit was over.

Valedictorian Brooke Kay took time to thank several who had a positive influence on her life - God, family, teachers, and friends. She took the audience on a journey through the campuses of Leonard ISD starting at Leonard Elementary with kindergarten - where they "took a tour of the building with a gingerbread man, had a field trip to the dairy museum, and signed

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countless Valentine cards."

Kay said Junior High was all about the love - who was dating who - and the looks changing. And then finally at high school where they got a choice on classes.

She assured her class with the Bible verse Jeremiah 29:11, which says, "'For I know the plans I have for you,' declares the LORD, 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future,'" and reminded her schoolmates and the audience that relationships with people and God are important.

"Congratulations class of 2011. We did it!" she said in closing.

LHS Principal Brad Connelly took the podium next for the awards presentations. Following the scholarships, Leonard ISD School Board President Bill Watson and Superintendent Larry LaFavers presented each student with their high school diploma. Many students used their walk as an opportunity to stand out from the rest - speaking to the audience or their family, dancing, blowing kisses, etc. as they walked.

Once all had received their diplomas, they took part in several traditions customary at commencement exercises. The first was the ribbon cutting ceremony where students cut a carnation flower from a continuous ribbon, which signifies that they are breaking ties with Leonard High School. That was followed by the traditional turning of the rings from facing inward to facing outward, and the moving of the tassel from the right to the left. The final event was the graduates' recessional and tossing of the caps.
